Whereas, The Maharashtra Public Universities Act, 2016 (VI of 2017) has come into force from 1st March 2017;

AND

Whereas, Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University (hereinafter "the University") is now being governed by The Maharashtra Public Universities Act, 2016 (VI of 2017) (hereinafter the Act);

AND

Whereas, the University has issued Direction No. 15 of 2017 dealing with the composition of the four faculties created by the Act, whereunder the existing different faculties of the University have been merged into the four new faculties created by the Act, by which the subject of social work has been included in the faculty of Inter-disciplinary Studies;

AND

Whereas, the University has issued Direction No. 10 of 2019 prescribing "conditions for conduct of undergraduate and post graduate examinations based on credit based/choice based credit system, in all faculties"

AND

Whereas, Direction No.33 of 2017 entitled "Examinations leading to the Post-graduate Degree of Master of Social Work (Faculty of Interdisciplinary Studies", governing the post-graduate degree course of Master of Social Work (Semester Pattern) (Choice Based Credit System) has lapsed by virtue of the provisions of the proviso to section 12 (8) of the

Act (VI of 2017) necessitating issuance of a fresh Direction incorporating the provisions of the said (lapsed) Direction with suitable modifications necessitated by the Direction No.10 of 2019 and the decisions taken by the various bodies i.e. Board of Studies (Social Work) in its meeting dated 28/02/2019 and 09 May 2019, Faculty in its meeting dt. 30/05/2019 and Academic Council in its meeting dt. 10/06/2019;

Now, therefore, I, Dr. Siddharthavinayak P. Kane, Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, in exercise of my powers under section 12(8) of the Act, do hereby issue the following Directions:

1. **This Direction shall be called “EXAMINATIONS LEADING TO THE POST GRADUATE DEGREE OF MASTER OF SOCIAL WORK (SEMESTER-PATTERN) (CHOICE-BASED CREDIT SYSTEM), (FACULTY OF INTERDISCIPLINARY STUDIES), DIRECTION, 2019.”**
2. This Direction shall be applicable from the academic session 2019-20. (The students who had taken admission in Ist semester in the academic session 2016-17, 2017-18 and taking admission in IIIrd semester in the academic session 2018-19 and onward shall also be governed by this Direction).
3. In this Direction unless the context requires otherwise;
 - a. **“ATKT”** means “Allowed to Keep Term” in the higher semester, as per the rules herein.
 - b. **“Board of Studies”** means Board of studies of the University in the discipline/subjects concerned.
 - c. **“Credit”** means the unit by which the course work is measured. It is measured in terms of weekly class hours assigned to a Course.
 - d. **“Credit Point” (CP):** It is the value obtained by multiplying the Grade Point by the Credit i.e. No. of Credits assigned for the course x Grade Points secured for that course.
 - e. **“Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)”**: CGPA refers to the Cumulative Grade Point Average weighted across all the semesters. It is obtained by dividing total number of credit points in all the semesters by the total number of credits in all the semesters.
 - f. **“Degree”** means Post Graduate Degree in Social Work.

- g. **“Grade Letter”**: It is an index to indicate the performance of a student in a particular course/ Paper. It is the transformation of actual marks secured by a student in a course/paper. It is indicated by a Grade letter O, A, B, C, D, E and F. There is a range of marks for each Grade.
- h. **“Grade Point”** : Grade Point is weight allotted to each grade letter depending on the marks awarded in a course/paper
- i. **“Post Graduate programme”** means Master’s degree course in the subject of Social Work in the Faculty of Inter-Disciplinary Studies.
- j. **“Student”** means student admitted to Post Graduate programmes under this Direction.
- k. **Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA)**: SGPA indicates the performance of a student in a given Semester. It is based on the total credit points earned by the student in all the courses and the total number of credits assigned to the courses/papers in a Semester.
- l. **“University”**: means Rashtrasant Tukdoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur.

4. **Admission & Eligibility to the Course**: Subject to the compliance with the provisions of this Direction and of other ordinances in force from time to time an applicant for admission to Semester-I examination shall have passed any Bachelor’s Degree examination of this university or degree examination of any other statutory, recognized university, in any discipline, which is equivalent to the Bachelor’s Degree of this university. Preference shall be given to the holder of Bachelor of Social Work degree.

5. **Duration of the Course**: The M.S.W. Course shall be of two academic years consisting of semester-I and II in the first year and Semester III and IV in the second year.

6. **Medium of Instruction**: The medium of instructions shall be English. However, the students may write their examinations in either English or Marathi or Hindi languages.

7. **Course Structure**: Following shall be the structure of the Master of Social Work programme. This programme shall comprise theory papers, field work practicum and Research Project spread in various semesters. It shall have core, elective and foundation courses (subjects) as described and detailed herein:

A. **Core courses (subjects)**: It means the Compulsory papers offered in all the four semesters which are core to the discipline of Social Work. The students admitted to the course will have to compulsorily take these papers.

B. Elective (Specialisation): It refers to the papers which a student of the course can choose from the pool of papers prescribed in the syllabus.

C. Foundation Course/Elective: It refers to those courses which are included in the Appendix of this Direction which a student of this programme and the students of other programmes may opt. In the alternative students of the programme may opt for an elective course from the list of elective courses prescribed for the students of the third and fourth semesters.

D. SOCIAL WORK PRACTICUM: It is compulsory for all the students of the programme.

E. Research Project Work: It is compulsory for all the students of the programme.

8. SEMESTERWISE DETAIL COURSE STRUCTURE:

Note: i. passing in social work practicum, in each semester, is mandatory. In the fourth

semester if a student remains absent in the internal and external viva voce examination for the social work practicum he/she shall be declared to have failed in the subject.

- ii. The students will have to pass independently in theory and practical exams. The criteria for passing examination will be 40% marks in each subject/paper, including marks of internal assessment. However, where a student remains absent in the internal assessment he/she shall be declared to have failed in that subject/paper. In order to be declared successful in the semester examination the student must obtain minimum 50% of the aggregate marks. **Where a student fails to secure the required 50% aggregate marks he/she shall be declared to have failed in the examination. However, such student will get exemption in all those subjects/paper in which he/she has secure 50% marks**
- iii. Internal assessment shall be as per the guidelines given herein.
- iv. In the fourth semester each student will have to appear in both the internal and external viva-voce examination for Social Work Practicum and Research Project Work for being declared successful.
- v. Where a student fails in social work practicum and/ or Research Project Work the student will have to take casual admission in the college for successful completion of the social work practicum and Research Project Work.
- vi. Each theory subject/ course and Research Project Work shall consist of **four credits**, one credit being of one clock hour per week for theory subject and two clock hours for Research Project Work. However, the social work practicum shall carry **six credits**, one credit being of two clock hour's duration.
- vii. Each student shall be supervised in the Research Project Work by an approved permanent faculty member/approved contributory teacher (CHB) of Social Sciences from the same affiliated Institute/College. No faculty member shall be permitted to supervise not more than 20 MSW students in their research project work in an academic year.
- viii. Students of M.S.W. Semester IVth are required to submit the final copy of the Research Project Work on or before 30th March. External viva-voce, to be conducted by an examiner appointed by the University, shall be scheduled before the end of academic session.
- ix. The scope of each subject shall be as prescribed in the syllabus, of the MSW CBCS programme.

9. **Examination and Declaration of Results:**

- i. Examination of all the subjects of all the semesters of the post-graduate programme under this Direction shall be conducted by the university twice in a year as per the scheme of the examination given herein. The examinations shall be held at such places and on such dates as notified by the University.
- ii. The other Ordinances and Directions of the University relating to conduct of examinations and declaration of results, including award of grace marks, improvement of Grade / Division, preparation of merit list , to the extent they are not inconsistent with the provisions of this Direction shall also be applicable.
- iii. The fees for the tuition, examination, social work practicum and other fees shall be as prescribed by the university from time to time.
- iv. The examinee at each of the examination shall have option of not being declared successful at the examination in case he / she does not secure a minimum of grade equivalent to 50% marks at the examination. Once this option is exercised, the option shall be binding on the examinee for that Semester examination only and it shall not be revoked under any circumstances.
- v. No candidate shall be admitted to an examination under this direction, if he / she have already passed the same examination of this university or of any other university.
- vi. Examinee successful at the final examination shall on payment of the prescribed fees, will be entitled for the award of the degree in the prescribed form signed by the Vice Chancellor.

vii. **Grade & Grade Point** –Marks secured by an examinee in the examination shall be converted in to grades and grade point as shown in the following table:

Note: The significance of the various grades is as follows:

Outstanding: Excellent analysis of the topic. Accurate knowledge of the primary material, wide range of reading, logical development of ideas, originality in approaching the subject, neat and systematic organization of content, elegant and lucid style;

Excellent: Excellent is the quality of excelling, of being truly the best at something, acquaintance with seminal publications.

Very Good: Excellent analysis of the topic. Accurate knowledge of the primary material, logical development of ideas, neat and systematic organization of content, effective and clear expression;

Good: Good analysis and treatment of the topic. Basic knowledge of the primary material, logical development of ideas, neat and systematic organization of content, effective and clear expression;

Fair: Some important points covered. Basic knowledge of the primary material, logical development of ideas, neat and systematic organization of content, good language or expression;

Average: Some points discussed. Basic knowledge and organization of the primary material, possessing acceptable capacity of expression.

Pass: Any two of the above

Fail: None of the above

viii. A student failing to score minimum 40% marks in each head of passing and 50% marks in the aggregate shall be declared fail.

ix. A student who passes the Social Work Practicum but fails in Term End Examinations of a course shall be given F grade. However Internal marks shall be retained for further declaration of result.

x. Where a student fails in Social Work Practicum, in any semester, but secures exemption in theory papers such student will not be eligible for getting admission in the next semester.

xi. **Credit Point (C)**—Credit Point is calculated for each and every successful papers/course as per following formula.
Credit Point (C) = Credit x Grade Point

xii. Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA): SGPA indicates the performance of a student in a given Semester. SGPA is based on the total credit points earned by the student in all the courses and the total number of credits assigned to the courses/papers in a Semester. SGPA shall be rounded off to two decimal points.

$$\text{SGPA} = \frac{\text{Total Credit Points in the Semester}}{\text{Total Number of Credits for the Semester}}$$

Provided that SGPA is computed only if the candidate passes in all the courses (gets a minimum 'E' Grade in all Courses).

xiii. Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA): A student will be allotted **Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)** after clearing all the four Semesters and it shall be calculated as per the following formula

$$\text{CGPA} = \frac{(\text{SGPA}) \text{ I} \times (\text{Cr}) \text{ I} + (\text{SGPA}) \text{ II} \times (\text{Cr}) \text{ II} + (\text{SGPA}) \text{ III} \times (\text{Cr}) \text{ III} + (\text{SGPA}) \text{ IV} \times (\text{Cr}) \text{ IV}}{(\text{Cr}) \text{ I} + (\text{Cr}) \text{ II} + (\text{Cr}) \text{ III} + (\text{Cr}) \text{ IV}}$$

Where, (SGPA) I = SGPA of Semester-I; (Cr) I = Total Credits for Semester-I
 (SGPA) II = SGPA of Semester-II; (Cr) II = Total Credits for Semester-II
 (SGPA) III = SGPA of Semester-III; (Cr) III = Total Credits for Semester-III
 (SGPA) IV = SGPA of Semester-IV; (Cr) IV = Total Credits for Semester-IV

xiv. CGPA will be calculated after clearing all courses of semester I to IV and the grade/class shall be awarded on the basis of following table

Equivalent percentage calculation will be based on the following formula:

$$\text{Equivalent \%} = (\text{CGPA} - 0.75) \times 10$$

Note: Final Mark List will only show the Grade and the Grade Points and not the marks.

xv. The candidate may take all the examinations as per the provisions of ATKT simultaneously but his result of final Semester shall not be declared unless he/she is declared successful at all lower examinations. (As per ordinance 10)



- xvi. Right of Rejection: Candidate shall have right to reject the result of Semester, subject to following conditions:
- a. The candidate shall have option to reject the result of Semester/Term End Examination and can appear afresh with all papers for rejected Semester End Examination.
 - b. Subject-wise rejection will not be permitted.
 - c. Candidate who rejects the result shall be allowed to appear in the subsequent examinations.
 - d. Rejection shall be exercised only once in each semester and rejection once exercised cannot be revoked under any circumstances.
 - e. Candidate should submit the application for the rejection along with Original Statement of Marks and payment of prescribed fees to university through college within the 15 days from the date of declaration

10. Guidelines for Students, Supervisors and Examiners regarding internal assessment

- i. In each semester the student will have to deliver a seminar on any topic relevant to the syllabus / subject encompassing the recent trends and development in that field / subject. The topic of the seminar will be decided at the beginning of each semester in consultation with the supervising teachers. The student has to deliver the seminar which will be followed by discussion. The seminar will be open to all the teachers of the department, invitees, and students.
- ii. The students should submit the assignment properly bound in two copies to the head of the department. The said shall be evaluated by the concerned supervisor / head of the department.
- iii. The marks of the Internal Assessment shall be forwarded to the university within due period through head of the Department. The record of the seminar and assignment should be preserved till the declaration of final result.
- iv. The internal assessment marks shall be awarded by the concerned teacher.
- v. The internal assessment shall be completed by the College / University at least 15 days prior to the final examination of each semester. The Marks shall be sent to the University immediately after the assessment in the prescribed format.

- vi The internal assessment marks assigned to each theory paper as mentioned in awarded on the basis of assignments like class test, attendance, home assignment , group discussions or any other innovative practice / activity.
- vii There shall be one assignment (as described above) per Theory paper.
- viii. There shall be no separate / extra allotment of work load to the teacher concerned. He/ She shall conduct the internal assessment activity during the regular teaching days / periods as a part of regular teaching activity.
- ix. The concerned teacher / department / college shall have to keep the record of all the above activities until six months after the declaration of the results of that semester.
- x. At the beginning of each semester, every teacher / department / college shall inform his / her students unambiguously the method he / she propose to adopt and the scheme of marking for internal assessment.
- xi Teacher shall announce the schedule of activity for internal assessment in advance in consultation with HOD / Principal.
- xii Final submission of internal marks to the University shall be before the commencement of the University Theory / Practical examinations whichever is later.
- xiii. Marking Scheme: The College shall submit the internal marks in the following format

11. Rules of A.T.K.T.: The admission of students in the various semesters of the programme shall be as per the provisions of Direction No. 10 of 2019 (as amended or replaced from time to time).



12. ABSORPTION SCHEME

- i. The Failure students of MSW – **II (Semester – III & IV)** as per Old Course (Semester Pattern CBS) scheme, will have 3 chances to clear the examinations from academic year 2017-18. If they fail to complete & pass till Winter 2018 they will be absorbed in the CBCS course under this Direction. Such student will be given exemption in the equivalent subjects/papers of the CBS course as per the equivalence chart herein.
- ii. Students admitted to the MSW –CBCS programme, governed by Direction No. 16 of 2016, shall be admitted in the third semester of the MSW -CBCS programme under this Direction, if they have otherwise become eligible as per the ATKT rules under Direction No. 16 of 2016.
- iii. Students admitted to the MSW –CBCS programme, governed by Direction No. 16 of 2016 who have not become eligible for admission to third semester under the ATKT rules of the said Direction, will have 3 chances to clear the examinations, from academic year 2017-18 .If they fail to complete & pass first and second semester examinations till Winter 2018, further they shall be absorbed in the first and second semester of the MSW -CBCS programme under this Direction. Such students shall be given exemption in the equivalent subjects of the first semester and second semester, as per the equivalence chart herein, and they shall be required to take admission as casual students for the new subjects under the present Direction.
- iv. The students who had taken admission in the MSW- CBS programme before 2016-17 and who have become eligible for admission to higher semesters of the said course shall be absorbed in the MSW –CBCS programme under the present Direction by giving exemption in the equivalent subject /papers, as per the equivalence chart herein.
